NY Times Online - http://www.nytimes.com

Read 20 articles of the *NY Times Online* each month before being asked to subscribe. Reach an article through a search engine or social network and read that for free, as well.

Time for Kids - http://www.timeforkids.com

While there is a subscription fee, a selection of informational text is available for free online. Articles run no longer than about 500 words in the categories of *The Nation, Around The World, Science, Entertainment, Health, Sports*, and *Special*. A randomly chosen article was found to have a 1110 Lexile measure.

Examples of student writing (Kid Reporters) may be useful as examples and kid reporter profiles may help students identify themselves as developing writers.

There are regular opportunities for students to write and submit for publication. *Additional features are available with subscriptions.*

Scholastic has 12 classroom magazines for grades PreK-12 which focus in the areas of math, science, social studies, language arts, and news. Some publish limited online versions. Two examples below.

Scholastic News Online -

Scholastic News Online includes "high-interest" current event articles and highlights from the print magazine. Articles *include Features*, News, Science, Social Studies, articles from other scholastic publications, like Storyworks, which features students, and "news for and by kids" – Scholastic Kids Press Corps and Blog.

The New York Times Upfront - http://upfront.scholastic.com

The online edition of *The New York Times Upfront* publishes a selection of articles from the print and complete digital edition (which also comes with interactive resources.) Types of articles include *News And Trends*, *Features, Times Past, The Ethicist, Debate (pro and con perspectives on issues)*, and *Teen Voices*. Word counts are approximately 1500 for articles in the times past section, and a randomly chosen article was found to have a 1230 Lexile measure. Recommends itself for grades 7-12.

Google Scholar - http://scholar.google.com

This search engine, with advanced search function, indexes abstracts and full text of articles from scholarly journals (peer reviewed and non-peer reviewed), as well as previews of scholarly books. Citations to other publications are included, as are links to related articles.

National Geographic - http://www.nationalgeographic.com

Articles from the magazine, news articles related to geography, science, animals, and the environment (as well as maps, photos, videos and games).

EBSCO Host - http://www.ebscohost.com

EBSCO is an information services and online reference giant which serves K-12 schools and public libraries (in addition to colleges, medical institutions, government institutions and corporations) EBSCO publishes 350 full-text and secondary research databases and has an amazing search system.

Gale Cengage Learning - http://www.gale.cengage.com

Not EBSCO, but also amazing. See the selection: http://www.gale.cengage.com/product_sites/index.htm Especially useful for students, the *In Context* sites include: web-like interface; multi-media content; text-to-speech technology; and document translator (French, Spanish, Japanese, German, Italian, Portuguese, simplified Chinese, and Korean). Among the *In Context* sites are Science, US History, World History, Global Issues, Student Resources, and Opposing Viewpoints (with the related Critical Thinking Resource Center).

Opposing Viewpoints in Context helps students explore issues from all perspectives and includes the following (list copied from website)

- More than 14,000 pro/con viewpoint essays
- 5,000+ topic overviews
- More than 300 primary source documents
- 300 biographies of social activists and reformers
